This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

Please see our Music Policy (published on our website) in addition to this information.

- Our school publishes the school curriculum for music for each year group on our school website.
- Each class is allocated a specific time slot of 45 minutes on their timetable for teaching music in addition to our Big Sing in whole school assembly (where singing skills from the curriculum are taught.)
- Our school music curriculum follows Bolton & BwD Music Service's Skills
 Progression Framework which is closely aligned to the model music curriculum
 (March 2021).

- During lesson time pupils have the opportunity to sing and explore a wide range
 of classroom based percussion instruments including chime bars and
 glockenspiels taught across the school to allow for progression.
- In addition to their weekly music lesson, year 3 are taught drumming as wholeclass ensemble teaching (WOPs) delivered by specialist teacher from Music Service.
- We work in partnership with our local music service to provide specialist curriculum music teaching in Year 5 and Year 6.
- We are increasing access for disabled pupils and supporting pupils with special educational needs (SEND) by ensuring they are supported by staff in music lessons so they can participate at their own level and the instruments they use are considered and adjustments made where necessary.
- We have achieved the Music Mark award for our commitment to providing a high quality music education for all children and young people (2024-25).

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

- Year 2 children are invited to participate in recorder club.
- Year 1 and 2 children are invited to participate in singing club.
- Key Stage 2 are invited to participate in choir.
- Reception children are invited to participate in music, dance and drama club.
- We are also very proud to be included in Bolton & BwD Music Service's "Furthering Talent" programme which is the result of a recognised group of our children being recognised for their musical ability. Furthering Talent children (selected by Bolton & BwD music service) participate in small group lessons (guitar or strings) weekly and are loaned their instrument and any other equipment the need free of charge. In addition to home practise, a practise space is designated for them twice weekly in school.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

- Each year group is allocated a "music buddy" class and on a termly basis they perform for each other.
- Each week, within assembly, Year 1-6 children participate in a "Big Sing."
- Choir perform at Bolton Music festival and also in assemblies throughout the year to showcase their achievements.
- Furthering Talent children perform in assemblies throughout the year to showcase their achievements.
- Children in Early Years regularly showcase singing to parents.
- The year 6 leaver's show features music and singing.
- Year 4 participate in a music workshop where musicians from Bolton & BwD music Service perform for them and then involve them in playing music (this is free of charge to parents).
- At the beginning of the school year Bolton & BwD music Service perform the "Music Live" concert to year 1-6 (this is free of charge to parents).

In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

- We plan on working with Bolton & BwD Music Service to replace the Furthering Talent children who have left in Year 6.
- The Big Sing will have a key focus in a weekly assembly and we will ensure that singing is a feature of school life in addition to singing in lessons and that singing skills are taught.
- Within the year we will seek parental opinion again on the purchase of individual or small group woodwind lessons from the music service and act on the information we receive as in previous years.
- We will ensure that children can confidently use and apply unit specific vocabulary to help them to articulate what they know and remember.

- We will evaluate how teachers are using percussion instruments to meet the objectives on the progression grid for music and to provide support and training on the use of percussion instruments if needed.
- We will provide ongoing training for EYFS staff in regards to the teaching of music and the inclusion of music as part of continuous and enhanced provision.
